

Our Interview Model

StoryCorps interviews are **casual** conversations between two people who know each other

Conversations are facilitated by a StoryCorps staff member

Not scripted or rehearsed

Each interview is 40 minutes long

What does Story do with your interview?

It's up to you.

You receive a digital download of your interview no matter what.

You can sign a General Release form, which gives StoryCorps permission to save your interview in our <u>Online Archive</u> and to send a copy to the <u>Library of Congress</u>.


or

You can choose not to archive your interview.

You can keep it private or share it with whomever you like.

In this case, StoryCorps will not save your interview.





OPENER

What is something that we wouldn't know if you just by looking at you?

INTERVIEWING BEST PRACTICES

Ask open-ended questions.

Ask both fact and feeling-based questions.

Be ok with silence. Have patience.

Ask follow-up questions.

Avoid asking long, complicated questions.

INTERVIEWING BEST PRACTICES

The best interviews are the ones that sound like natural conversations. Everyone has a story and your job as an interviewer is to help your guest share their story.

- Prepare for the interview;
- Connect with the interviewee;
- Relax and be yourself!

Preparation:

- Research the subject
- Research the guest—get their bio, know their positions
- Pre-interview them when possible

Examples of Great Questions

- Where did you grow up?
- What was (town/neighborhood) like?
- Can you describe your childhood?
- What were your grandparents/parents like?
- Did you have siblings? How would you describe your relationship?
- What are your favorite memories or stories about your family?
- Describe your personality when you were a child.
- What traditions have been passed down in your family?
- Do you have children? What was the most rewarding/ most challenging part of being a parent?
- What has brought you joy in life? What has been your biggest challenge?
- What life lessons have you learned that you'd like to share?
- What are you most proud of?
- How would you like to be remembered?

COVID-19 Questions

- What has given you comfort and hope during this time?
- What has been the most challenging part of this experience?
- what is the toughest part of your days right now? The best?
- What's the biggest way your life has changed because of the pandemic?
- Is there someone you can't see right now who you really wish you could?
- How is this experience different from other historical events you've lived through?
- Do you or have you had COVID-19? What is/was that experience like for you?
- What memory of this time do you think will stay with you?
- Has this experience changed you? If so, how?
- What have you learned from this experience?

Examples of great follow-up questions

How did that make you feel?

What happened next?

What were you thinking when that happened?

Can you describe him/her/them?

Can you paint a picture of that in words?

Can you think of any examples of that?

Tell me more about...

Sound Quality Tips

- Wear headphones to prevent echoing. Turn down the audio on your computer.
- Pick a room that is quiet and has strong wificonnectivity.
- Turn off cell phones or put them in airplane mode.

Turn off fans, TVs, and music in nearby rooms.
 Let people know you are recording.

AUDIO QUALITY BEST PRACTICES

Use rooms that have:

- Carpeted floors
- Drop ceilingsClosed windows and drapes
- Irregular shapesFull bookcases

Avoid using rooms that are large and have:

- Uncovered or tiled floors
- High ceilings
- Square shapes
- Bare walls
- Big windows without curtains
- Noisy appliances or audible background noise

How to "sound-treat" a space:



Put down a thick rug



Cover 1/2 of the walls with heavy blankets



Shut all the windows and close all drapes



Find comfortable chairs that lock in a fixed position
